

COURSE DESCRIPTIONS & PREREQUISITES:

BAND: (1 Credit) Prerequisites – Previous participation in the band and Director's Approval. Band is a curricular study of instrumental repertoire from varied eras and genres. Required performances include football games, marching band festivals, community parades (i.e. Winter & Memorial Day), school events, pep rallies, Music Performance Assessments (adjudications), and concerts (fall, winter and spring), and Commencement. Members of the band will study units in both the Marching and Concert Band settings (year-long course) and are required to attend all summer (Band Camp) and after-school rehearsals throughout the year. All Students are also required to attend lessons as scheduled by the Band Director. This is a 6 day/rotation, or 5 day/week class. Enrollment in fewer days is only granted for direct course conflicts, NOT for study halls. NO extra-curricular membership is granted. Students will not be permitted to drop once summer Band Camp begins. (Grades 9-12)

HONORS BAND: (1 Credit) Prerequisites – Audition and Director's Approval. (Weighted 1.05 Course Level C 100 Point Scale) This course (scheduled concurrently with Band Class) provides an opportunity for accelerated students to broaden their music education while earning weighted credit for supplemental work. ALL prerequisites and course requirements for Band Class will apply to Honors Band. Students must be enrolled 6 days/rotation to fully benefit from any additional weight/credit. Coursework includes, but is not limited to auditioning for Alle-Kiski Honors Band and PMEA Honors Band; research projects based on the students' primary instruments, composers and performers; attendance at "outside" concerts, playing assessments, peer teaching (MS/Elem) and a student recital. Students will not be permitted to drop once summer Band Camp begins. (Grades 9-12)

BANDFRONT: (0.25 Credit, Period 9) Prerequisites – Audition and Director's Approval. *This course is intended for members who have met the audition requirements for the band-front squads (Drill Team, Colorguard, Honorguard), AND do NOT know how to play an instrument.* In order to maintain balanced enrollment between the marching and concert band ensembles, students currently enrolled in band (play an instrument), and pass the Band Front audition, are required to schedule Band Class. Students who pass the audition and do not know how to play an instrument are to schedule Bandfront Class. Students must meet all yearlong marching requirements as stated for the "Band" class. Required performances include football games, marching band festivals, community parades (i.e. Winter & Memorial Day), school events and pep rallies. Students are also required to attend all summer (Band Camp) and after-school rehearsals throughout the year. Fundamentals of choreography, prop usage and marching are the key components of study and student performance. NO extra-curricular / non-graded membership is granted. Students will not be permitted to drop once summer Band Camp begins. (Grades 9-12)

JAZZ ENSEMBLE: (1 Credit) Prerequisites – Enrollment in Band Class (for traditional band instruments), Audition and Director's approval. This course is designed around the study of jazz history, scales (blues and various other modes), theory, jazz band and jazz combo literature, and improvisation. All instrumental sections will be limited in a manner yielding a full and balanced ensemble. Auditions may be required to fill limited positions, with preference to students currently enrolled in Band Class. Students are required to perform at all scheduled concerts and festivals. In addition to class time, attendance is also required at all before / after school rehearsals as scheduled by the Director. Students are permitted to enroll in both Jazz Ensemble and Stage Band if they meet the <u>prerequisites</u> and have room in their schedule. (Grades 9-12)

STAGE BAND: (1 Credit, Period 9/Homeroom) Prerequisites – Enrollment in Band Class (for traditional band instruments), Audition and Director's approval. This course is designed around the study of jazz history, scales (blues and various other modes), theory, big band literature and improvisation. All instrumental sections will be limited in a manner yielding a full and balanced ensemble. Auditions may be required to fill limited positions, with preference to students currently enrolled in Band Class. Ensemble may also be split into two groups, pending enrollment and auditions. Students are required to perform at all scheduled concerts and festivals. In addition to class time, attendance is also required at all after school rehearsals as scheduled by the Director. Students are permitted to enroll in both Stage Band and Jazz Ensemble if they meet the <u>prerequisites</u> and have room in their schedule. (Grades 9-12)

MUSIC THEORY I: (1 Credit) Prerequisite – Director's Approval. This course will involve a study of the mechanics of music, key signatures, scales, intervals and chords in written and aural form. This course helps to prepare future music majors or minors for college level theory courses, and also services music enthusiasts who would like to know more about musical form. Students must have prior knowledge of music and be able to demonstrate musical literacy through instrumental or vocal performance, or ensemble participation. Current enrollment in choir or band is encouraged. Students must be able to apply the skills learned here via an instrument or voice. Basic piano skills are a plus. (Grades 9-12)

HONORS MUSIC THEORY II: (1 Credit) Prerequisites - Successful completion of Music Theory I and Director's Approval. (Weighted 1.05 Course Level C 100 Point Scale) This course is designed to expand upon the fundamental skills of Theory & Harmony I, taking students to a deeper understanding of musical form and structure. Honors Music Theory II offers an emphasis on aural training, solfeggio, and application. Students will explore arranging and composition based on standard and current literature, with projects involving performance of student work. Basic piano keyboarding is incorporated into many elements of this course. (Grades 10-12)

MUSIC RECORDING & PRODUCTION: (1 Credit) Prerequisite – Instructor's Approval. This course includes the study of the physics of sound, signal flow, stereo systems, multi-track recording, digital synthesizers, sequencers, computers, and Musical Instrumental Digital Interface (MIDI). M.R.P utilizes digital audio workstations (DAW), various software programs - including GarageBand, ProTools and Soundtrap, as well as studio & field recording equipment. Prior to this course, students must have a strong and applied understanding of basic music theory (rhythm, melody, harmony & form). Electronically produced sound (loops, beats, etc.) and recordings will be used as a medium for creating and performing musical projects and compositions. Attendance at school performances outside of class may be required, as scheduled by the instructor.

REHEARSALS & PERFORMANCES:

- Rehearsals are typically scheduled for Tuesday evenings (6-9pm) and Thursdays afterschool (2:30-4:30pm) throughout the school year. Adjustments to this routine will be posted on the GoogleCalendar and announced as necessary. Please remember that it is your responsibility to stay informed to adhere to the schedule. Reminders are also sent out on a regular basis via Remind101
- Dress rehearsals for Concert Band and Jazz performances typically take place 1-2 days prior to the event and are REQUIRED for ALL members. It is not acceptable to have less than 100% participation leading into a performance
- ALL scheduled rehearsals and performances are graded and required for their respective classes.

Performances scheduled over holiday weekends (Thanksgiving, Memorial Day, etc.) are required and graded. In order to adequately represent our school, family activities and vacations must be scheduled around these events. If the school district and community expects the Band to be there, that includes all of us. Your cooperation is expected and appreciated. Students failing to attend Memorial Day weekend events and/or Commencement may not be permitted to attend Kennywood Day in August, in addition to the loss of credit for these scheduled events.

DISCIPLINE:

- Members must meet the same academic and disciplinary requirements as outlined for all school activities. Academic and disciplinary eligibility are required in order to participate in any extra-curricular / non-graded activities including, but not limited to the Band Trip.
- If a Band member is suspended for violating school policy, they will be suspended from performing as well, and will lose credit for that performance.
- Band members may be benched from performing for reasons including, but not limited to the following:
 - Not meeting performance standards as assessed in class/rehearsal.
 - o Failure to participate in class or rehearsal. Excessive absences or tardiness.
 - o Unethical or deceptive behavior. Violation of class or school discipline policy.
 - o Consistently poor attitude and effort. Failure to adequately perform as instructed.
- Any member of the program may be dismissed from their position or the organization for failure to complete their
 responsibilities, insubordination, conduct unbecoming a leader of our organization, violation of school district
 policy, or other circumstances as determined by the Band Director and/or district administration.
- NO food or drink (INCLUDING GUM) is permitted in the rehearsal or classrooms, nor while in uniform unless otherwise instructed by the Band Director.

EQUIPMENT:

- Instruments, Props, etc. are expected to be kept in proper working order at ALL times, regardless of ownership (School Issued / Personal).
- Failure to care for School Property may result in disciplinary action by the school district (See HHS Handbook regarding vandalism).
- Students using School-Issued Equipment will be held responsible for the cost of the repair or replacement of items damaged due to negligence. This includes "ACCIDENTS".
- Equipment (including Music) is to be properly stored in its respective cases / cabinets in the Band and Storage
 Rooms. Each student is assigned a specific place for instruments, music, equipment, etc. You will put your things
 away properly. You are responsible for turning in everything that has been issued to you. Failure to do so may
 result in a school obligation, monetary penalty and loss of points.
- Lockers will be assigned to every instrumentalist. These are for <u>Band Instruments and Equipment Only</u>. All lockers
 are required to be secured with a <u>District</u> lock. Lost locks must be paid for by the student and will be turned in as an
 obligation to the school.

DRESS CODE:

The High School Dress Code applies to all band functions (class, practices, performances, trips, etc.).
 Failure to adhere to the dress code will result in disciplinary action as per the building administration, as well as removal from band activities/functions and loss of credit.

YES – t-shirts, sleeveless <u>t-shirts</u>
"athletic" shoes
shorts ("fingertip length")

NO – tank tops, spaghetti straps, belly shirts sandals, flip-flops, etc. short-shorts, rolled shorts, etc. visible undergarments, profane or offensive language or graphics

MARCHING UNIFORMS:

- Jeans are NOT permitted under marching uniform pants (instrumentalists or fronts), ever!
- Hair is to be worn up under the band hats. Hair that is too long to be tucked under is to be neatly worn in a "bun" above the collar. Extreme/distracting hair colors are not permitted.
- ALL Uniforms are to be turned in when designated by the Band Boosters.

 Dry-cleaning fees must be paid to the Boosters before a uniform will be issued to you.
- Students will be held monetarily responsible for the loss or damage of any and all issued district property (uniforms, equipment, etc.). Money owed to the district will be turned in as an obligation. If the funds are available, fees will be paid for out of your student account.
- Brown calf-length socks are required for Instrumentalists and Honor Guard.
- White ankle socks are required for Drill Team and Colorguard.
- Bandfront headpieces, hairstyles and make-up will be worn as instructed by the Bandfront Sponsor.
- All band shoes and laces must be kept clean and WHITE at all times!
- No earrings, visible piercings or jewelry, watches, or nail polish are permitted for any public performances.
- The Marching Band "Summer Uniform" consists of Khaki PANTS (Dickies Ordered via Boosters), Gold Polos (tucked
 in), Band Shoes, Brown Socks and Belts (issued by Boosters). This will be worn for Kennywood, Pie Night, Memorial
 Day, as instructed by the Director
- Raincoats will be worn as instructed.
- RamPride T-Shirts (Instrumentalists) and White Short Sleeve T-Shirts (Bandfronts) will be worn under uniform jackets and tops at all times. Sleeveless shirts of any kind are not permitted.
- Uniforms will be worn while traveling as instructed by the Director. Changing will NOT take place on the band buses.
- Uniforms will be worn in the stands as instructed by the Director.

CONCERT BAND ATTIRE:

- Gentlemen will wear black socks and dress shoes and plain white t-shirts.
- Ladies will wear black dress shoes.
- ALL will wear formal Concert Uniforms as instructed (tuxedos, jackets, vests, ties, blouses, skirts, etc.).
- Commencement attire consists of khaki PANTS, white collared dress shirts/blouses, and dark dress shoes

JAZZ ENSEMBLE & STAGE BAND ATTIRE:

- Gentlemen and ladies will wear ALL BLACK dress clothes (i.e. pants, long skirts, dress shirts, blouses, dress shoes).
- All skirts must be knee-length or longer. Ladies shoulders are to be covered.
- Jackets and ties for gentlemen are not required but are encouraged.
- Formal Concert Uniforms will be worn as instructed.

BAND CAMP (ALL Practices are required):

- Band Camp Week I ALL Members
 - o July 26-28

- Band Camp Week II ALL Members

- Band Camp Week III All Members
 - o Aug 8, 8:00am 5:00pm
 - o Aug 9, Noon-5pm + Pie Night
- Pie Night Rain Date August 10 (Required Performance)
- Kennywood Fall Fantasy Parade (Required Performance) August 11 after Group Photo (8:00am).
- Lunch (Aug 1-4 & 8) will be provided free of charge.
- Dinner (August 2) will be provided free of charge.
- Students are permitted to "brown bag" or have food delivered. However, all must remain on campus for the duration.
- Don't forget your hats, sunglasses, sunscreen, tennis shoes, water bottles, etc.
- Please arrange your vacations, doctor's appointments, driver's tests, etc. around this schedule.
- NOTE: Work IS NOT considered an excused absence. You are students first, and employees second. Be proactive in letting your bosses know well in advance what your scheduled requirements are. As offered in the past, the staff is more than willing to explain to your employers the status of our activities as School Functions. **
- Camp time will only be split with other <u>school-sponsored activities</u> as long as time is <u>shared fairly and EQUALLY</u> with those activities. Please don't ask to leave band early or come late in order to get somewhere else on time. THAT is not a fair compromise. The "sharing" has to happen on BOTH SIDES.

EXCUSED ABSENCES:

- 1. Illness (with a written excuse)
- 2. Family Emergency
- 3. Death in the family
- 4. Religious / Holy Obligations

Written documentation must be turned in to the Band Director IN ADVANCE to be kept on file.

If it's not 1, 2, 3 or 4 – it is NOT an excused absence. Work is NEVER an excused absence.

- Excuses must include the student's name, grade, parent / guardian's name, reason for absence (# 1, 2, 3 or 4), and <u>contact information</u> so that the absence can be verified. Failure to do so will constitute an UNEXCUSED absence.
- Students are NOT permitted to miss <u>performances</u> for athletic games, or other like events. Students will only be excused from rehearsals for these events. <u>Dress Rehearsals</u> for Concert Band, Jazz Ensemble and Stage Band are REQUIRED. We must have everyone present to rehearse together at least once before performances. Failure to attend dress rehearsals may result in dismissal from performance and loss of credit.
- Excused absences do NOT give you "automatic credit". They simply allow you the opportunity to make up the missed work. Students must still complete a make-up assignment in order to receive any credit for your excused absence. Unexcused absences are automatic "zeros".
- Notifying the Director of an absence does NOT mean the absence is excused.
- Desire or willingness to make up an absence does NOT mean the absence is excused.
- Make-up Assignments for excused absences will be determined by the director and will correspond to the particular activity or event that is missed. This will include, but not be limited to...
 - o Individual performance of music and/or routines.
 - o Practice logs.
 - o Audio/Video Recordings of student skill demonstration.
 - Music Theory Exercises.
- Performances consist of each student's public demonstration of skill, as well as their contribution to the ensemble as a group. Please Note: It is impossible to fully replicate a group performance (interaction with, and contribution to the ensemble in a live setting). This performance component is required as per the Academic Standards for Music Education and our adopted course curriculum.
- Alternative make-up assignments (i.e. written work) for performances are only granted due to a student's physical inability to perform due to injury or medical condition. Long-term situations are dealt with on a case-by-case basis.
- It has always been permitted to share practice time between band and other <u>HHS sponsored activities</u> (sports, etc.). However, leaving Band early / coming late, in order to attend another activity is not a fair division of time unless a sacrifice of time from the conflicting activity occurs as well.
- When requesting an excused absence, please take into consideration the number of daily/weekly practices and games many sports require in comparison to our limited after school practice & performance schedule especially for Concert Band. Excused absences from rehearsals will be handled as noted above (See "Make-up Assignments").
- It is the students' responsibility to contact the Director regarding an excused absence in order to make up any necessary work in a timely manner. Make-up assignments for excused absences must be completed within 2 weeks of the absence and/or before the end of the current marking period whichever comes first.
- WORK IS NEVER AN EXCUSED ABSENCE!

HIGHLANDS VARSITY MARCHING BAND COVID-19 HEALTH/SAFETY PLAN (For Reference)

The Highlands Varsity Marching Band Program (Staff, Students & Boosters) will adhere to the following procedures, as approved by the Highlands School District Administration and Board of Directors.

Social Distancing and Proximity Concerns

- Staff will mark individual student placements in/on all rehearsal venues to encourage 6 foot social distancing. All students will have an assigned spot in their warm-up, parade block and field formations.
- Staff will encourage students to engage in individual skill work at home. Access to recordings of music, drill and choreography will be provided for individual practice.
- Staff will assign students to smaller groups when practicing together (ex. By instrument section, squad, etc.). This process will be utilized when any indoor rehearsal is necessary and appropriate social distancing for larger groups is not possible.
- Rehearsals should take place outdoors when possible. Rehearsals may occur indoors as long as a minimum of 6 feet between each individual can be achieved.
- Full ensemble rehearsals on the practice field will be carefully designed and executed with social distancing practices
 in mind. Drill formations will maintain a minimum of a "4 step" interval (7.5 feet).
- Appropriate social distancing will be employed during all performances (ie. All field drill/formations, while seated or playing stand cheers in the bleachers at football games, etc.).
- Per Highlands Administration Directive, there will be no participation in large group / public performances during the Fall Semester (ie. Community Parades, Pie Night, Winter Concerts, etc.).
- Students will wait in their vehicles until practice/performances are ready to start. Carpools will be discouraged.
- Practices will be held outside when weather and field availability allows.
- District assistance is requested with the rental of a large tent to be used on the lawn adjacent F-Wing and the Varsity
 Marching Band's practice field (back parking lot) to provide appropriate social distancing for all activities hindered by
 poor weather.

Equipment/Personal Items

- Students will provide or be assigned his/her own (not shared) equipment. He/she will be required to individually mark his/her equipment in a specific manner AND to be responsible for the safe use, storage and placement of this equipment at all times. When at all possible, students will load, unload or otherwise transport their own items.
- Proper disinfection procedures (as per the National Association for Music Education), specific to various types of instruments & equipment will be shared with students & families. These procedures will be followed for all schoolsupplied instruments & equipment on campus.
- All students who are able to manage their own instruments or equipment by bringing them to and from rehearsals
 or performances, must do so. Members of the drumline and low brass sections are the only exception to this
 guideline.
- Students may be required to keep assigned uniforms and accessories at home.
- For events requiring uniforms, all students may be instructed to arrive and depart in uniform. This can help alleviate challenges with facilities for changing in and out of uniform while on school premises.
- Students will keep all personal items in a bag with his/her named marked across the top of the bag. Students will not
 be permitted to share any personal items. Individual bags will be placed in students' assigned Band Room lockers, or
 in an assigned space inside/outside the building to maintain proper social distancing during all breaks and times
 outside of rehearsal/performance.
- All Brass players are asked to bring a small (kitchen) towel, rag, "puppy pad", etc. to be used when emptying spit valves during all indoor rehearsals. These items are to be taken home for laundering or replacement each day.

Hydration and Food

- Students will be required to bring his/her own water in a clearly marked bottle(s). Students will not be permitted to share drinks. Large water coolers/igloos will not be used for practices or performances until deemed safe to do so by all governing bodies involved.
- Snacks will only be provided if available in a pre-packaged format. Food will be distributed via adults wearing proper PPE. Students will not be permitted to share snacks. If/when the above practices are not possible, students will be instructed to provide their own food/snacks for any rehearsals & performances.
- Meals typically provided by the district during camp will be done so in accordance with all policies & procedures outlined by Mr. Prichard, the Food Service Department and district leadership.

Nonessential Visitors/Spectators

- Staff will permit no visitors or spectators at practices or performances unless approved by Highlands Administration.
- Volunteers/Boosters (having provided approved Clearances) will only be permitted to attend rehearsals or
 performances to assist with duties normally & specifically delegated to said individuals (ie. Chaperoning, Medical
 Assistance, Uniform Fittings, Equipment, Food Distribution, Fundraising, etc.). All adults present will be required to
 wear proper PPE as per current CDC and district guidelines.
- Staff will not permit students to have close contact with spectators/fans at any time.

Event Travel

- Travel to away football games or performances will only occur when allowed by both the Highlands Administration AND the host district/venue, and in accordance with all current governing policies/mandates.
- Staff will assign seats on the bus with one student and his/her bag per seat.
- Budgetary constraints impacting additional buses to maintain appropriate social distancing must be addressed prior to any travel outside of the district.
- Staff, students and chaperones will be required to wear masks on the bus (unless unable to do so due to medical condition or other such approved circumstance).

Symptomatic Restrictions

- Staff will require anyone (staff, student or volunteer) to stay home if he/she is feeling sick. When an individual returns, he/she must have a note from a physician stating he/she is cleared to participate. Any physical restrictions must be clearly communicated in the physician's note.
- Staff will require anyone (staff, student or volunteer) to stay home if he/she tests positive for COVID-19. Staff will notify the district of all incidences. Individuals will be permitted to return to Band when the school district permits. When an individual returns, he/she must have a note from a physician stating he/she is cleared to participate. Any physical restrictions must be clearly communicated in the physician's note.
- Staff will require anyone (staff, student or volunteer) to go home from a practice or performance if he/she exhibits symptoms of COVID-19. A parent/guardian will be called AND the school district will be notified of all incidences. Individuals will be permitted to return to Band when the school district permits. When an individual returns, he/she must have a note from a physician stating he/she is cleared to participate. Any physical restrictions must be clearly communicated in the physician's note.
- Staff will require anyone (staff, student or volunteer) to stay at home if he/she has been in close contact with someone who has tested positive for COVID-19. The school district will be notified of all incidences. Individuals will be permitted to return to Band when the school district permits.
- All of the above will be communicated in advance of the regular season.

Covid-19 Symptoms, Temperature Checks & Pre-Event Checks

- Cough
- Shortness of breath or difficulty breathing
- Chills
- Repeated shaking with chills
- Muscle pain
- Headache
- Sore throat
- Loss of taste or smell
- Diarrhea
- Feeling feverish or a measured temperature greater than or equal 100.4 degrees F.
- Known close contact with a person who is lab-confirmed to have Covid-19
- Anyone exhibiting the above symptoms, or in contact with the above symptoms should stay home and contact their physician immediately.
- Parents/guardians are expected to check student temperatures and symptoms daily and prior to students leaving home for any band activities.
- Staff can arrive early to practices/performances to do temperature checks on any persons unable to do so on their own.
- Anyone with a temperature above 100.4 degrees F will not be allowed to enter any facilities and will be sent home. Parents/guardians will be called and the school district will be notified of all incidences.

• Individuals will be permitted to return to Band when the school district permits. Upon return, he/she must have a note from a physician stating he/she is cleared to participate. Any physical restrictions must be clearly communicated in the physician's note. All of the above will be communicated prior to the start of the regular season.

Hand Hygiene and Respiratory Etiquette

- Staff, students & volunteers will be instructed, and are expected to routinely wash their hands for 20 seconds, with proper soap. Hand sanitizer (at least 60% alcohol) should be used, upon arrival and leaving, and when bathrooms with proper soap and paper towels is not available.
- Staff, students and any volunteers will be encouraged to sneeze/cough into their elbows, to immediately throw away any used tissues in a designated garbage can, then immediately wash their hands.
- All students are encouraged to bring/supplement with their own hand sanitizer.

Face Coverings

- Staff, students & volunteers will wear face coverings as per all current mandates.
- Face coverings will be utilized when unable to maintain social distancing (ie. transitions, breaks, non-performance activities, buses, etc.).

Procedures and Communication

- Staff will maintain accurate attendance rosters and groupings for use in possible contact tracing if needed.
- Staff will post health and safety information contained in this plan on the Band's Google Classroom, Booster Webpage, and announced via REMIND. In addition, this information will be made a part of our 2020-2021 course syllabus/handbook and contract.
- Any modifications to this plan will be conducted to align with all current mandates/orders. Updated information will
 be submitted to district administration for approval and communicated to students/families via the above noted
 platforms.

GRADING:

- Assessment Philosophy The learning process that takes place in music class is uniquely and inherently designed to tap into the students' varied and diverse skills sets. Students will utilize elements of mathematics, physics, sociology, reading & comprehension, physical application & exertion, history, critical thinking & response, cooperative learning, and artistic interpretation on a daily basis. Performances exist as the culminating experience in the instrumental program whereby students demonstrate mastery of the skill sets taught, learned and practiced in rehearsal. Each student should be challenged to achieve his or her full potential. Growth as an individual musician and member of the ensemble is encouraged and expected. Each member is valued for the unique dimension that they bring to our community of musicians. With this in mind, all students will be assessed based on what and how they contribute to their educational experience, as well as what they know, understand and can do. The curriculum and grading polices for all ensemble and music classes are aligned with the state and national standards for music education.
 - Attendance Bands are ensemble experiences. Missing a rehearsal negatively impacts the group dynamic. Therefore, attendance is expected at all rehearsals, including afterschool and evening rehearsals. It is not enough to simply "know your part". Fitting your piece into the puzzle is just as important. Consequently, excused absences must be limited to illness, emergency, and otherwise unavoidable conflicts (dealt with on a case-by-case basis). Deductions will be taken for tardiness and unexcused absences.
 - <u>Preparedness</u> Students should come to class and rehearsals with all the necessary equipment and materials, i.e. instrument in good working order, music, pencil, valve/slide oil, drum sticks, reeds, etc.; an open mind and a serious musical attitude toward learning. Deductions will be taken for lack of preparation.
 - <u>Effort & Participation</u> Students should be in their assigned seats on time and ready to perform. Correct posture is an accurate indication of engagement in the learning activity. Deductions will be taken for lack of engagement with the ensemble, poor attitude, etc. We want to develop students as leaders and contributors to the group each in their own unique way. Success begets enjoyment. A positive, hardworking, creative, relevant and enjoyable atmosphere is what we want every time we meet.
 - <u>Improvement/Growth</u> Students are expected to demonstrate ongoing growth and advancement as a musician and member of the ensemble. It's not enough to simply show up and play. Taking "bad days" into consideration, students must meet individual and ensemble goals for improvement, tailored to their ability and potential.
 - <u>Performance Assessment</u> Students will perform as an ensemble, by stand(s), by section, in small groups and as individuals. Assessments will be based on the student's ability to demonstrate mastery of relevant executive skills (as per instrument, squad, etc.), perform sight-reading, rhythms, dynamics, intonation, notes, and tempo accurately and with a good tone quality. Participation in ensemble performances/concerts is the culminating demonstration of skill mastery. Individual skill demonstration and ensemble contribution in live performance are key components to public performance assessments. These performances are considered exam grades for class.
 - Assignments & Exams Students may be asked to periodically submit individual recordings for assessment. A selfassessment may accompany recordings. Writing assignments and reflections will be assigned on pertinent topics
 including performance evaluation, current events in music, music theory, etc. Deductions will be taken for late
 submissions and work not meeting the grade-level standard.
 - <u>Band Lessons</u> are a regular and expected part of each student's weekly routine. Everyone is required to complete the minimum number of lessons as assigned. Students are grouped with "like" instruments. Schedules are posted in advance. Make-up lessons will be offered during the scheduled rotation, after school and by appointment. Students who are unable to attend a scheduled lesson or make-up during a given week are permitted to submit hand-written notification of private lesson attendance for <u>that week</u> by their private lesson teacher, or an at-home practice log as instructed by the director. There is a limit to the number of alternative lesson credits accepted each marking period.

TRIPS AND FUND-RAISERS:

- THE BAND TRIP IS A KEYSTONE EVENT FOR EVERY MEMBER OF THE BAND PROGRAM! Ample opportunity will be provided each year to assist you in raising the needed funds. The Director will determine the destination, purpose, scope and dates of the Band Trip. Ball-park estimates of cost are provided as soon as this information is available.
- The Varsity Band Booster Organization maintains an accurate record of Student Accounts. Each member will be responsible for fund-raising the necessary money or paying the difference in order to participate in the Spring Band Trip.
- Each trip will contain elements of <u>performance</u>, <u>competition</u>, <u>or music education</u> of some kind. We are a performing organization, and will conduct ourselves accordingly. Trips are NOT designed to simply be a vacation but rather a demonstration of your talents as you represent your school, and a reward for your hard work throughout the year.
- <u>We cannot successfully perform/compete without everyone's participation</u>. If we have inadequate participation in any particular section of the band, or in general, the trip may be cancelled at the Director's discretion. This decision would be made prior to turning the initial deposit to the tour company.
- Deposits/payments will be made towards the trip after each fund-raiser, or as designated by the Band Boosters.
- Trip deposits are NON-REFUNDABLE and are an indication of your intent and commitment to attend the trip. The final cost is based on the number of students who commit to go. If students back out, the cost per student will increase. Therefore, all students who commit to go and rescind must find another member to take their place.
- In order to maintain the organizations "non-profit" status, fund-raised balances carried by graduating seniors may be "willed" to other <u>current</u> members of the organization or will be dissolved into the general fund to aid all students, as per the Band Booster Bi-Laws. Unused/extra fundraised money cannot be refunded. Please consult your Band Booster Handbook.
- All luggage, etc. will be checked and tagged before departure. Any student found in violation of school district policy
 or conducting himself or herself in a manner unbecoming a member of this organization would be subject to
 disciplinary action. Upon review, students face potential removal from the current trip regardless of payment,
 probation from future trips and possible removal from the organization.

ACADEMIC AND DISCIPLINARY ELIBILITY MUST BE MET IN ORDER TO PARTICIPATE IN THIS ACTIVITY – REGARDLESS OF ANY PAYMENTS MADE TOWARD THE BAND TRIP. IF YOU ARE DEAMED INELIGIBLE BY THE ADMINSTRATION PRIOR TO DEPARTURE, YOU WILL NOT BE PERMITTED TO ATTEND, PAYMENTS WILL BE FORFEITED AND YOU WILL REMAIN FINANCIALLY RESPONSIBLE FOR THE BALANCE OF YOUR TRIP IN ORDER NOT TO PENALIZE THE GROUP BY NEEDING TO COVER YOUR EXPENSES.

TRAVEL FOR PUBLIC PERFORMANCES AND ACTIVITIES:

Please pay close attention to directions given regarding arrival and departure times / locations for our performances. Return times will be estimated to the best of our ability. Please make arrangements for rides accordingly. ALL MEMBERS OF THE ORGANIZATION ARE REQUIRED TO TRAVEL TOGETHER BOTH TO AND FROM PERFORMANCES. WE ARE A GROUP AND WILL TRAVEL AS ONE. The Band Director, PRIOR TO THE DAY OF THE PERFORMANCE, must approve any EXTENUATING circumstances. Excuses / Permission must be documented in writing and kept on file by the Band Director.

BAND BOOSTERS ORGANIZATION:

Every parent / guardian of a Band member (Instrumentalist, Bandfront, Manager, Jazz Ensemble, Stage Band, Honor Guard) is automatically a member of the Varsity Band Boosters Organization. This group of people exists to support our students in a variety of ways. Success is highly dependent upon ACTIVE membership. Every little bit of time you can volunteer is helpful.

Meetings are held on a regular basis - THE 1ST MONDAY OF EVERY MONTH AT 7:00 PM IN THE HIGH SCHOOL CAFETERIA – UNLESS OTHERWISE STATED BY THE ORGANIZATION. PLEASE CONSULT THE BAND'S GOOGLE CALENDAR.

Minutes from the meetings and current fundraising information are posted outside the Band Room. Copies of the Band Boosters' Handbook / Bi-Laws are available for all members. They contain more detailed information regarding the policies and activities of the Band Boosters Organization. <u>Please make sure your contact information is up-to-date.</u>

BAND COUNCIL:

- **ELECTIONS** will be held during Commencement practice each spring. Terms of office will last no more than one school year. Nominations will be taken from a majority of the organization. Verbal "seconds" must accompany the acceptance of each nomination. Drum Majors and Bandfront Captains are not eligible to run for Band Offices. Candidates must be enrolled in band class (marching / concert) for the entire year. Voting will be anonymous. Votes will be tallied by the out-going President and/or Drum Major(s). Offices will be independently filled in "descending" order. To provide a greater degree of opportunity for students to be involved, a "losing" candidate is free to run for successive offices if he/she so chooses.
- **PRESIDENT** Any Senior Band member is eligible for this office. Duties of the President include, but are not limited to: preside over all meetings of the Band Council; to work with the Drum Majors to coordinate the efforts of the officers, captains, section leaders; to organize Band Camp social activities; to lead and promote hospitality at public functions; to assist Band Director with "extra effort" awards; to compile and maintain an accurate database of band alumni; to assist in coordinating band alumni functions (ie. Homecoming Alumni Band, Commencement Band, etc.).
- VICE-PRESIDENT Any Junior or Senior Band member is eligible for this office. Duties of the Vice-President include, but are not limited to: assisting the President in his/her duties; to fulfill the obligations of the President in his/her absence; to assist the Band Booster Uniform Chairperson with the assignment and inspection of uniforms.
- TREASURER Any Junior or Senior Band member is eligible for this office. Duties of the Treasurer include, but are not limited to: keeping an accurate record of student contributions to the Activity Account; to manage the purchase of and collection of funds for minor expenses (lyres, gloves, congratulations / condolence / thank you cards, Historian supplies); to assist the Band Booster Student Accounts Chairperson in accounting for student fund-raising contributions. Periodic monetary collections may be issued at the discretion of the Officer Corp and under the advisement of the Band Director.
- SECRETARIES (1 Junior & 1 Sophomore) Nominations are given by members of the senior class. Duties of the
 Secretaries include, but are not limited to: handling all correspondence of the Band (including congratulation, getwell, and condolence cards); to assist the Drum Majors in accurately accounting for attendance, music and equipment
 deadlines; to assist in the taking of role at rehearsals and performances; to assist the historian in collecting publicity,
 programs, etc.; and to promote band activities and accomplishments via the morning announcements, Band Booster
 newsletter, district website and billboard, etc.
- HISTORIAN Nominations are given by members of the Senior Class. The duties of the Historian include, but are not
 limited to: maintaining an accurate account of band activities and honors (photographs, programs, newspaper
 clippings, etc); to create scrapbooks for members of the Senior Class to be presented at the Spring Banquet, as well as
 an annual scrapbook for the Band Library. Assist the Secretaries in publicity and bringing recognition to Band activities
 throughout the school and community.
- SOPHOMORE AND FRESHMEN REPRESENTATIVES Nominations and elections are limited to members of each respective class. Duties of these Representatives include, but are not limited to: acting as the formal voice of their respective groups in meetings of the Band Council and to the Band Director and Staff. (Election of Sophomore Rep is contingent on Historian not being a Sophomore.)
- THE EXECUTIVE BOARD The offices of President, Vice-President, Treasurer, and Secretaries comprise the Executive Board. Each member of the Executive Board will be paired up with his/her respective Band Booster Officer. The purpose of this activity is to create a "job shadowing" environment for one of the major projects undertaken by that Band Booster Officer. This will provide useful experience for the Student Officer and insight into the workings of our Band Booster Organization.

SECTION LEADERS:

Section leaders will be determined during Band Camp by audition, as needed. Auditions may be held again, at the discretion of the Band Director, during concert season. Students will be granted ONE challenge to upgrade their position within their section. Positions may be changed or revoked at the discretion of the Band Staff.

Duties of section leaders include, but are not limited to:

- Ensure your section has its necessary equipment (pencils, gloves, lyres, music, brown socks, ram pride shirts, etc.)
- Check-off routings in music
- Coach section members on horn positions, marching fundamentals, etc.
- Inform Band Director of section members having difficulty or discipline problems.
- Motivate section to achieve highest level of success, be on-time, give their best efforts, and openly communicate.
- Ensure that sections are cooperative, contributing to rehearsals, prepared to play musical entrances, not talking, doing homework, etc.
- ** Failure to comply with these expectations, failure to fulfill established responsibilities, as well as disrespect or conduct unbecoming a Section Leader may constitute loss of position.

DRUM MAJORS:

Students must be in **good academic/disciplinary standing** with the school and carry a **positive monetary balance** with the booster organization (i.e. Activity Fee) in order to be eligible to audition. The number of Drum Majors, eligibility requirements, rank, responsibilities, and duties are determined by the Band Director each year. Drum Majors will serve the organization for the entire year. Auditions will be held each spring for interested instrumentalists. Drum Majors may be required to share the responsibilities of directing and playing/marching at the Band Director's discretion. Drum Majors are required to schedule Band Class a minimum of 3 days per week.

The Director and Band Staff will finalize the selection decision. Positions may be changed or revoked at the discretion of the Band Staff.

<u>Duties of the Drum Major(s) include, but are not limited to:</u>

- Act as a positive role model for all members of the organization.
- Help in the implementation of the Band Director's instructions.
- Direct the Band at rehearsals and performances.
- Coach all members of the organization in marching fundamentals and routines.
- Assist the Band Council and Section Leaders in their duties.
- Maintain the music library for Marching, Concert, & Jazz Bands.
- Assist the Band Director with Instrument & Equipment Inventories.
- Direct the Managers in transferring and setting up equipment.

MANAGERS & HONOR GUARD:

Managers / Honor Guard will be selected from members of the 8th-12th Grades, at the discretion of the Band Director. Additional members of the Honor Guard will be selected via Bandfront Auditions the preceding spring. Managers / Honor Guard are given full privilege to ALL activities and responsibilities of the Band Program.

<u>Duties of the Managers / Honor Guard include, but are not limited:</u>

- Present the American Flag, Banner, Rifle, etc. at ALL Marching Performances.
- ASSIST in the loading and unloading of the equipment truck as instructed.
 - o **Note to Band Members, they're NOT here to do it for you!! You are responsible for your own equipment.
- Pass out and collect plumes, raincoats, etc. as needed.
- Place Bandfront equipment on the field as directed by the Band Staff.
- Provide water, etc. during marching rehearsals.
- Manage Zero Points, Ladders, etc.
- Keep equipment / instruments neat and in order on the truck, the field, and in storage, etc.
- Assist Staff, Chaperones, Student Leaders as needed.
- Remember your commitment is year-round. It does NOT end after football season. *

^{**} Failure to comply with these expectations, failure to fulfill established responsibilities, as well as disrespect or conduct unbecoming a Drum Major will constitute loss of position.

^{**} Failure to comply with these expectations, failure to fulfill established responsibilities, as well as disrespect or conduct unbecoming a Manager or Honor Guard member will constitute loss of position.

BANDFRONTS:

SELECTION OF BANDFRONT MEMBERS

- A panel of qualified judges will rate and select Bandfront Members.
- All prospective members must be judged at the scheduled Audition to be selected.
- All prospective members must return their audition packet contract, signed by both student and parent/guardian.
- Selection of alternates will be left to the discretion of the Director and Sponsor.
- The scoring by the judges is Final and remains Confidential.
- ALL members of the squad who are currently instrumentalists in band are expected to participate in Concert Band and schedule "Band Class".
- All members of the squad who are not instrumentalists are required to schedule "Bandfront Class".
- All activities are graded and credited as part of the district's band curriculum.
- ALL policies and course requirements for Marching Band outlined in this manual apply to ALL members of the Bandfront.
- Students must be in **good academic/disciplinary standing** with the school and carry a **positive monetary balance** with the booster organization (i.e. Activity Fee) in order to be eligible to audition.
- Students not performing to standard during the season will be put on an improvement plan and provided extra help. Failure to make the necessary changes/improvements may result in probationary placement on the Honor Guard or benching from performances.

BANDFRONT CAPTAINS

The Bandfront squads will have captains as determined by the Band Director and Sponsor via the audition process. The # of captains chosen will be left to the Band Director's discretion. You must have at least one year on the squad to be eligible to audition for captain and have scored in the top percentile at squad auditions. Selection will be based on the squad audition score, choreography and performance of a brief original routine, interview, resume, letters of recommendation, and general attitude, dedication, and leadership abilities.

The Director and the Sponsors will finalize the selection decision. Positions may be changed or revoked at the discretion of the Band Staff.

The duties of the Captains include, but are not limited to:

- Ensure that your squad has its necessary equipment (Flags, Poms, Batons, Uniforms, Band Shirts, etc.)
 - o NOTE: The Captains are NOT here to clean up after you, or load/unload for you. Each member is responsible for her own equipment.
- Coach squad members on routines and marching fundamentals, etc.
- Create and teach routines as outlined by the Director and Sponsor.
- Inform Band Director of squad members having difficulty with routines or discipline problems.
- Motivate squads to achieve the highest level of success, be on-time, give their best efforts, and openly communicate.

** Other duties and guidelines for both Captains and Bandfront Members are outlined in your audition packets. Be sure to carefully read them. Failure to comply with these expectations, failure to fulfill established responsibilities, as well as disrespect or conduct unbecoming a Captain may constitute loss of position.

SPONSORSHIP

- The Sponsor(s) will supervise the squad at all practices and performances.
- The Sponsor will give constructive criticism of the squad's attitude, skills, and behavior.
- The Sponsor will take care of the finances dealing with the ordering of equipment, under the advisement of the Director.
- The Sponsor will act as a liaison between the squad and the Band Director.
- The Sponsor will be responsible for enforcing a uniform appearance of the squads, preparation of routines and equipment management.
- The Sponsor will facilitate auditions each spring.

HONORS BAND & PMEA / AK EVENTS:

HHS Honors Band Class

Students may enroll in Honors Band Class with the Director's approval. This course will offer a weighted credit for participation in HS Band. Honors Band is scheduled at the same time as regular band class (marching / concert). <u>Upon approval</u>, you only need to schedule Honors Band class, NOT Band AND Honors Band.

In addition to all class requirements for Band, Honors Band students must meet requirements including, but not limited to the following...

- Research Projects based on the student's primary instrument and performers of this instrument.
- Essays and reflections on current events and issues in music.
- Auditions for PMEA and Alle-Kiski Honors Bands
- Performance of a solo during the spring HHS Honors Band Recital
- Playing Quizzes & Theory Exams as scheduled by the Director
- Documented practice time outside of school.
- Attendance at Band Lessons during the school day.
- Attendance at and reflection on outside (non-Highlands) concert events.
- Assistance with the Elementary & Middle School Band Programs.

PMEA District 1 Scholarship -

The Scholarship Committee has developed the following criteria for awarding three music scholarships to students in our district. Each award will be \$1,000.00 (approved August 2008):

- 1. The recipient must have definite plans for a career in music education or music-related field.
- 2. Three scholarships will be awarded each year; one in strings, one in wind/percussion and one in vocal music.
- 3. The award will be based on music achievement and academic excellence.
- 4. An applicant must currently be a senior in a District 1 High School and a participant in the current District 1 Festival. A student's placement in the festival is not a factor in granting the award.
- 5. Two recommendations must accompany each application. One recommendation must be written by the student's home school Music Director PMEA member, and one must be written from any of the following: private music teacher, high school teacher in any discipline, guidance counselor, church music director, or high school principal.
- 6. The student must include with the application and recommendations, the following: a) a high school transcript, b) an essay on why music education/music is important, why the student wants to pursue a career in music, and future ambitions and goals upon graduating from high school and college.
- 7. Completed applications must be mailed to the Scholarship Committee Chair to:

- 8. The award recipients for the District 1 Scholarships will be announced at the recipients' spring concert. A PMEA officer will present the award.
- 9. Applications will be available in the fall newsletter and at Honors and District 1 SHS Festivals.
- 10. The committee reserves the right to give no award in any area where applicants are not deemed qualified.

AK Audition Repertoire:

Students must prepare the 1 page Etude in the audition packet available in the Band Room. Etudes rotate on a yearly basis. Make sure you are preparing the correct etude. Additionally, students should be fluent on the Chromatic Scale over the full range of their instrument. Percussionists should be prepared for Timpani, Mallets and Battery Percussion Instruments.

Students NOT enrolled in Honors Band Class are still permitted and encouraged to audition for the Alle-Kiski and PMEA Honors Festivals as per the festivals' particular requirements.

PMEA District Band

- These Ensembles are selected via a combination of the Solo Audition (top of page) and lottery process. Interested students must complete all necessary paperwork as posted and instructed by the Director. These forms must include all required signatures and be returned by the posted deadline. Submission of these applications confirms the students' knowledge, understanding and commitment to the festival dates, requirements and responsibility to prepare all music if selected.
- Upon receipt of these forms, the Director makes his recommendations and submits these applications to the selection committee.
- The PMEA District 1 Jr. High Band is comprised of students in Grades 7-9.
- The PMEA District 1 Sr. High Band is comprised of students in Grades 10-12.
- ALL current Band students are eligible to turn in an application to the Director.
- Auditions may be required by the Director in order to better determine student qualifications before submitting any applications to the selection committee.

JAZZ ENSEMBLE & STAGE BAND:

The Highlands High School Jazz Classes are accelerated ensembles. In addition to having exceptional musical ability, members must be willing to go "above and beyond" the normal expectation. The ensembles explore a variety of musical repertoire within the genre of Jazz (including: Swing, Blues, Funk, Fusion, Be-Bop, Latin, and Dixieland).

REHEARSALS -

- Stage Band Class will meet a minimum of 4 mornings per week at 7:20am.
- Jazz Ensemble Class will meet 5 periods per week during the school day.
- All members enrolled in the Jazz Program are expected to be prepared and on time.
- Additional rehearsals will be required in preparation for performances.
- Additional sectionals may be required at the discretion of the Director.
- The group may be split into additional ensembles at the discretion of the Director and by audition.
- Each student is expected to put in consistent practice time at home.
- PRACTICING AT HOME IS WHERE YOU LEARN YOUR PART. REHEARSAL IS WHERE YOU LEARN EVERYONE ELSES.

VISTING ARTIST IN RESIDENCE SERIES (VAR) -

Efforts will be made to establish an artist-in-residence program. The purpose would be to bring a world-renowned musician into the school to work with all of the instrumental students (Grades 4-12). A series of lectures, clinics, master-classes, and demonstrations would culminate in a public performance featuring our Guest Artist and the high school ensemble(s). A daytime assembly may also be held to help excite, encourage and recruit future members of the band. Take pride in this activity. For many of you, opportunities like the VAR will only happen "once in a lifetime".

MEMBERSHIP -

- Due to the nature of jazz music, both in structure and in difficulty, membership into these ensembles is offered on a limited basis
- Members should have prior band experience and exposure to jazz music.
- AUDITIONS MAY BE HELD AT THE DISCRETION OF THE DIRECTOR.
- ALL members of the jazz program are expected to participate in the Fundraisers, Banquets, Band Trips, Band Booster Meetings, and other activities.
- The focus of the Instrumental Music Program is to maintain a solid foundation in musical skill and fundamentals through our Marching / Concert Band class. Therefore, ALL members are expected to enroll in the Marching / Concert Band class before enrolling in Jazz/Stage Class. Exceptions are only made for students subject to circumstances outside of their control (i.e., transfer students), medical exemptions from marching band, and those who do not know how to play a "standard band instrument".

INSTRUMENTATION (Per Ensemble) -

- It is preferred to have 1 student on each part.
- Maximum 2 students per part, unless otherwise noted. Multiple students playing a specific part may be required to "switch off" during rehearsals and performances. *

- ALTO I - TROMBONE I - ALTO II - TROMBONE II - TENOR I - TROMBONE III

- TENOR II - BASS TROMBONE / TUBA (IV) - BARI SAX - TROMBONE V (Optional)

- TRUMPET I - PIANO*

- TRUMPET II - GUITAR (Must be able to read music)*

- TRUMPET III - BASS*

- TRUMPET IV - PERCUSSION (Maximum 3, must be able to read music)*

- TRUMPET V (Optional) - VOCALIST (Per Audition by the director)

- All members of the rhythm section must be able to read music. Piano, Guitar, and Bass must be fluent in reading both chords and melodic lines.
- Members of the class will also explore elements of Music History, Theory, and Improvisation. Additional work and assignments may be required.

We willingly agree to comply with the state recommendations put forth by the HVMB and HSD to limit the exposure and spread of COVID-19 and other communicable diseases.
